Safety First:

- 1) The orphanage director, Gil Sanchez will be escorting our group from El Paso, TX through the border crossing to our destination in Mexico and assures us that safety is his number one priority. The orphanage receives a high volume of church groups, and it is completely private and safe.
- 2) We will be staying on site at the orphanage and will be eating most of our meals there. This helps to ensure our safety and makes sure we don't eat any contaminated food.
- 3) The town we will be working in is a small town of 12,000 people and so it does not deal with the problems and dangers of larger cities in Mexico.

Sign Up Requirements:



1) Put your name down that you are interested in going



2) Pay the \$100 initial deposit for *each* family member going by **Sunday, January 20** (non-refundable except in the case for sickness or family emergency). Checks made to “Cabot church of Christ”, or Cash in an envelope with your name on it. Pay the additional \$250 by **Sunday March 3**.



3) Attend the **4 pre-trip meetings**. Attending is a *requirement*. Also help in other ways to get ready for the trip.



4) Get a Passport.



5) Girls/ guys buy appropriate length shorts for the trip (just above the knee). You will be **required to bring your shorts** to a meeting to get them approved.



6) Turn in the necessary forms that are in the packet. They will need to be **notarized**. I know that you can get things notarized for \$5 at the UPS store (next to the Hallmark store)

They have limited internet at the campus. That means teens will not be able to use the internet but I will try to send out email updates several times during the trip letting everyone know how it is going.

It is possible for teens to buy a phone card there and make a call at the campus to parents. Calls will be very brief. Also, many people can activate their normal cell phones to work in Mexico. There is cell service at the orphanage.

Passports

- Passports are required. We recommend getting the traditional passport book (\$135) but passport cards (\$55) will work also.
- They say you should spend 2-3 weeks getting the necessary documents together for your application.
- According to government websites (and travel websites) it takes 6 weeks from the time of application, including mailing time to process passports applications.
- We recommend you start the process ASAP, but no later than the due date for final money to be turned in, Sunday, March 4.



Casa House Rules

Casa de la Esperanza means the "House of Hope." They strive to provide the best Christian care and environment for the children residing there, giving them the hope that only Jesus can provide. As we come to serve and help the children, remember that we are constantly setting examples for them, and we are here to serve the children. As Paul writes in I Corinthians 11:1, "Follow my example as I follow Christ." Therefore, there are a few basic house rules to keep in mind as we set the example of Christ daily. These rules were provided by Casa.

- Running and yelling are strictly outside activities.
- The children's bedrooms are reserved for sleeping, reading, visiting, and other quiet activities. Play is confined to designated areas both inside and out.
- Only cooks and dishwashers are allowed in the kitchen.
- Work groups are responsible for the cleaning of their respective work areas.
- If you see it dirty, clean it up, whether you made the mess or not.
- Respect the gender boundaries. (i.e., no wrestling between boys and girls, respecting privacy of both the boys and girls wings of the dorms, etc.)
- Special care should be taken while showing affection to the children, as well as other group members. This is not a trip for inappropriate relationships with the children or amongst yourselves. Many of the children come from backgrounds of physical and sexual abuse; therefore we must be conscious of our actions.
- Noise should be controlled after 7:00 p.m. as we have young children who need to be calmed down and put to bed at an early hour.
- Appropriate dress is required at all times. Shorts are permitted as long as they are loose fitting (i.e. no biker shorts) and are just above the knee. For those groups attending church services with us, it is a casual environment, but remember to be respectful. Girls are requested to wear skirts or dresses at church. Shorts, skirts and dresses should be no shorter than just above the knee.
- The wearing of short shorts, spaghetti straps, or similar clothing is not appropriate at Casa or anywhere else in this part of Mexico.



- They ask that no money be given directly to the children. If you are so inclined to provide financial support, please speak directly to Gil and he will make sure that the money is spent for the children's needs.
- Candy should be distributed at specific times so as not to upset the meal schedule.
- They do not allow sunbathing, foul or harsh language, bad behavior, smoking, CD players, video games, or roughhousing. You cannot buy or possess alcohol, drugs, fireworks, knives, guns or other weapons.
- The sewer system is septic tanks. This requires that toilet paper be put in the trash receptacle next to the toilet. Flushing toilet paper, feminine hygiene products or other solid items will clog the system.

Safety and Security



Northern Mexico is a relatively safe and secure area, and most of the stories of being robbed by banditos or getting Montezuma's Revenge are greatly exaggerated. Actually, violent crime is much less common in Mexico than in the U.S. In general, visitors to Mexico should take the same precautions they would take when traveling anywhere else.

- Keep money and valuables secure and out of sight
- Don't venture out alone or to areas where you are not familiar.
- The local residents of Cuauhtémoc and Anáhuac are used to seeing Americans, and are very friendly, polite, and helpful.

Drinking Water



Visitors who use common sense are also unlikely to develop serious food- or water-related illnesses. However, it is common to have some mild effects from the new foods you will experience. The water at Casa de la Esperanza comes from their own private water wells located on the property. It has been checked for purity, and is safe to drink. Last year we had no one get sick during the whole trip.

Eating

We will eat most of our meals at the orphanage, we might eat some meals in town. Here is a "sample" menu of what we typical meal schedule:

Elevation

Because of the elevation of Anáhuac (about 6000 ft.) many visitors get sunburned because they do not take the proper precautions of using sunscreen and wearing the appropriate clothing and hats that are required at this high elevation. Drink lots of liquid; it is a dry climate.
